Another note, a please-be-aware, from the SRS board:

We are thrilled to have so many members this year! This means that our room is full of music, members, chairs, music stands, and more things than we are used to. Chairs are set up with a center aisle, and with two aisles along the outer edges. We will set up more chairs (delightful duty!) to accommodate our increased numbers. **Please be sure not to obstruct any of the aisles**. And use the front rows! Our conductors are friendly! You'll have the best view of that allimportant downbeat! Some good suggestions from Kate Canan, our January conductor...

Too Many Pages!!! Help!!!

Since recorders often play vocal music from full score, with many pages, how can we deal with it without ending up with a pile of pages on the floor? Three pages fit nicely on a stand, especially secured with tape or our internationally famous Billie Bugs. More than that? The key is looking for rests or one handed spots in your music. Try this:

Put up page one on the left, and the rest of the pages in a stack on the right with page 2 on top. Play page 1, and while playing page 2 find a place where you have a hand free. Pull that page over to the left, so you have page 2 on the left and page 3 on the right. Continue to find a place on the right hand page where you have a hand free to pull the page to the left. It can be helpful to mark these in advance. (I have PULL! written over many pages of those pesky multipage scores.) You'll end up with a neat pile on the left with pages in the reverse order, easy to put back in order.

Putting music on a tablet is another solution--I use an iPad with the ForScore app, and you can use a foot pedal for page turns. But that's another article.

Added note: Kate saw our beloved Billie Bug magnets on stands in England when she toured there with the Recorder Orchestra of New York.

About the Sacramento Recorder Society

The Sacramento Recorder Society, founded in 1982, is a non-profit, taxexempt organization. It is a chapter of the American Recorder Society and an affiliate of the San Francisco Early Music Society. We welcome recorder players of all ages and abilities as well as players of other early music instruments such as lutes, viols, sackbuts, shawms, curtals, krummhorns, and percussion. Beginners are urged to study privately and learn fingerings and become comfortable reading music before joining the recorder orchestra.

We meet monthly (in non-Covid times) from September through June, from 6:45pm to 9:30pm on the first Tuesday of each month, at the Friends Meeting House, 890 57th Street, between J St. and H St. Most of our meetings are conducted by a professional early music specialist who teaches recorder technique and relevant music history and theory while exploring music of many eras.

Many of our members also play in smaller groups in members' homes during the rest of the month.

Listening to Early Music

Here are some possibilities:

- Sunday Baroque, which airs from 7am to 11am on 88.9 FM, KXPR.
- Harmonia provides podcasts at its website: <u>indianapublicmedia.org/</u> <u>harmonia</u>
- The Chicago Early Music website provides access to many early music resources. They are at: earlymusichicago.org
- <u>Magnatune.com</u> allows you to listen to music free and pay when you choose to download, or you can subscribe for \$15/month for unlimited downloads
- Millennium of Music: "The sources and mainstreams of European music from the thousand years before the birth of Bach." http://www.millenniumofmusic.com
- <u>recorder-radio.com</u> streams a variety of recorder music 24 hours a day
- Also available online: Concertzender Oude Muziek (mostly early music, there's an announcer every so often who is speaking Dutch). You can find these stations using Tune In Radio.
- The Boston classical station, WCRB, has an early music stream. Go to classicalwcrb.org, click on the play button, and the early music stream is one of your choices. Click on it!
