A Letter from the Editor

Dear Early Music Friends,

And here comes the new year, 2024, filled with the unknown. Janus, that two-headed god for whom the month was named, looks both back into the past and forward into the future. It's enjoyable to take a trip into the past and revisit pleasant memories. Many of mine are music-related: turning pages for my mother as she played the organ, singing in choirs, playing recorder with friends in college.

Susan Titus, one of our co-presidents, dipped into her musical past to share with us how she came to play the recorder. Here's her recorder story:

"My parents were both woodwind musicians, so they naturally arranged for my brother and me to have beginning recorder lessons when we were about seven and eight years old. A friend of theirs from Germany started us off. My brother soon lost interest, even though they bribed him with a basketball hoop, and the lessons ended after a year or so. I had a couple of years of piano lessons, then in fifth or sixth grade started on the flute, as there was an extra

one in the household. I had a good teacher and took it seriously, playing in junior high band, playing duets and trios with friends during lunch breaks, and getting "Ones" in contests. I played flute in high school orchestra and in the city's youth symphony, and although not a music major, took lessons in the Conservatory at Oberlin.

Our family took a trip to Europe in 1965, when I was 17. I hadn't brought my flute and missed it. So in Nurnberg, I found a music store and bought an inexpensive wooden soprano recorder and a couple of little books of music. For years, although flute was my main instrument, I enjoyed less serious playing on that Moeck. When I became aware of the Sacramento Recorder Society meeting not far from where I lived, I started attending monthly playing meetings and was excited by the quality of the conductors, who had me on the edge of my seat, focused and eager. Gradually it became apparent that it wasn't enough to just play soprano. I got first a plastic Yamaha tenor, then a good wooden Mollenhauer, with extra keys for comfort. Initially it was hard for me to give up playing the melody line, but I've come to deeply appreciate playing a lower instrument."

Our January Conductor Kate Canan



Kathryn Canan did not learn recorder in third grade. After her parents forced her to slave away on piano from an early age, for which she is now very grateful, she picked up flute and is still astounded at the adventures and friendships music has brought into her life.

At a Christmas party in 1991 she saw someone playing tenor recorder, went to a workshop on Renaissance music, and immediately developed severe instrument acquisition disorder. She has studied recorder privately with Hanneke van Proosdij and medieval music with Shira Kammen.

She also earned an M.A. in liberal arts at CSUS, specializing in medieval culture, so she is one of few world experts on diseases caused by elves.

She plays a variety of early music with Baroque and Beyond and keeps finding excuses for musical adventures with Early Music Maui, including shows at the Edinburgh Festival Fringe. Kathryn's CD of medieval English music with Briddes Roune, Lenten is Come, is available at Magnatune, Amazon and other online sites.

Moving up to Grass Valley in the Sierra foothills expanded her musical world again to Celtic music, learning and playing traditional music completely by ear, and yet another series of instruments--Celtic whistles and flutes in many styles and keys. Kathryn teaches recorder, whistle, and early flutes to students of all ages and levels in person or online.

Listening to Early Music

Here are some possibilities:

- Sunday Baroque, which airs from 7am to 11am on 88.9 FM, KXPR.
- Harmonia provides podcasts at its website: <u>indianapublicmedia.org/</u> harmonia
- The Chicago Early Music website provides access to many early music resources. They are at: earlymusichicago.org
- Magnatune.com allows you to listen to music free and pay when you choose to download, or you can subscribe for \$15/month for unlimited downloads
