#### March Into April . . .

We had a good time playing Madrigals at our early March meeting, under the conduction of the knowledgeable and energetic Tracia Barbieri. She introduced us to how the elements of Emotion, Imitation, Word Painting, Dance, Fiction, Innuendo, and Chromaticism appear and mingle to varying degrees in ten different compositions.

Our Secretary/Newsletter Editor/Contact person for Conductors, Patty Johnson, has had medical issues and is home to heal and recuperate under the care of her husband, daughter, friends and support systems. It will take time, but she will be working on getting back to playing the bass. We miss her and are eager for her return!

The current American Recorder Society quarterly magazine honors Hanneke van Proosdij, our Bay Area luminary who used to actually drive to Sacramento to conduct us, and also has an extensive article about Frans Bruggen, the Dutch musician who brought long neglected recorder-playing to fame and popularity in the 20<sup>th</sup> century. The magazine issue includes music for us to share: an SATB version of a Gershwin song, *The Man I Love*, a newly composed "accessible" duet for two tenor recorders by Suzanne M. Angevine, and two short, more challenging pieces for two altos by Marin Marais. Greta Haug-Hryciw had her initial recorder experience with the San Francisco branch of the New York Recorder Workshop in the early 1970s. Along with the late Jef Raskin she was instrumental in the revival of the San Francisco Recorder Society back in 2002 after many years of there being no chapter to play with in the city. Greta co-directs the Barbary Coast Recorder Orchestra (BCRO) with Glen Shannon, and is assistant director to Fred Palmer with the Mid-Peninsula Recorder Orchestra.

A San Francisco native with musical roots in the Bay Area classical and early music scenes that span three generations, Greta enjoys having a very active role in the recorder community, whether producing local events or performing in music projects. She has conducted chapter meetings and one-day workshops in person and online around the country. She is a founding member of the S.F. based recorder ensemble SDQ, coaches ensembles and students of all ages, and runs Voices of Music's After-School Recorder Classes in the Albany (CA) Unified School District. She is also a regular teacher for the Junior Recorder Society, which is also an educational outreach program of Voices of Music.

In the summer of 2023, Greta became assistant director for the SFEMS summer Recorder Workshop with Annette Bauer. Since 2016, she has been the organizer and producer of the Exhibition at the biennial Berkeley Festival (BFX), produced by the San Francisco Early Music Society. This year, she will roll off of the American Recorder Society Board of Directors after having served two terms from 2016-2024 with some of the most creative and wonderful people in the North American recorder community

Greta and her husband Lloyd live at the edge of the Pacific Ocean on the San Mateo County coast with Archie, a skinny little ginger cat who adopted them several years ago, and who comes and goes as he pleases.

### About the Sacramento Recorder Society

The Sacramento Recorder Society, founded in 1982, is a non-profit, tax-exempt organization. It is a chapter of the American Recorder Society and an affiliate of the San Francisco Early Music Society. We welcome recorder players of all ages and abilities as well as players of other early music instruments such as lutes, viols, sackbuts, shawms, curtals, krummhorns, and percussion. Beginners are urged to study privately and learn fingerings and be-come comfortable reading music before joining the recorder orchestra.

We meet monthly from September through June, from 6:45pm to 9:30pm on the first Tuesday of each month, at the Friends Meeting House, 890 57<sup>th</sup> Street, between J St. and H St. Most of our meetings are conducted by a professional early music specialist who teaches recorder technique and relevant music history and theory while exploring music of many eras.

Many of our members also play in smaller groups in members' homes during the rest of the month.

Here are some possibilities:

- Sunday Baroque, which airs from 7am to 11am on 88.9 FM, KXPR.
- Harmonia provides podcasts at its website:

- The Chicago Early Music website provides access to many early music resources at: <u>earlymusichicago.org</u>
- <u>Magnatune.com</u> allows you to listen to music free and pay when you choose to download, or you can subscribe for \$15/month for unlimited downloads
